A WORD ABOUT BAIL REFORM

In the segment, guest host Scarlett Johansson was shocked to discover that her dog held opposing political beliefs to her own. At one point, while arguing with her pet, she mentioned something about the importance of black lives. Her faithful friend retorted, "You've never even had a black friend in our apartment!"

HIGH HOLY DAYS – WHAT SHOULD I DO IN ADVANCE?

Get these few items squared away to ensure that you'll be able to spend the High Holy Days with your Emanu-El community:

- Renew your membership. You can do this by logging into your MyEmanu-El account at http://emanuelsf. magentrix.com/.
- 2. Decide where you'd like to spend Yom Kippur. Does being out in nature at Camp Newman appeal to you? If so, choose the Yom Kippur Retreat!
- 3. Are you planning to travel for the High Holy Days? Ask for reciprocity by filling out the form on the website.
- 4. Or do you have guests coming for that time? If they are affiliated, have them contact their synagogue now to send us proof of membership, and be sure to indicate that they will be your guests. If they are unaffiliated, you may purchase tickets for them (but only a limited number of tickets are available for purchase, so don't delay!) You'll find the ticket purchase form on the website.
- 5. If you are elderly or disabled and would like to have SilverRide transportation for Erev Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre, or after Yizkor, you can find the form on the High Holy Day website.
- 6. Will you need on-site child care for the High Holy Days? We can accommodate children ages 2–10, and the form is available on the website.
- 7. Would you like to list a loved one in the Memorial Book? You'll find a quick way to do that online.
- 8. Are you stocking up on healthy, non-perishable foods to bring to the food drive? Start clipping those coupons now!

Then sit back and relax while we mail out your High Holy Days passes (they will arrive in late August). Questions? Email the High Holy Day office at hhd@emanuelsf.org, or call (415) 751-2541 x138. The office is staffed on a part-time basis.

The truth is, no matter how warmly we feel toward African-Americans, with a few exceptions, most white people have few genuine friends who happen to be African-American. And not many African-American Christians really know individual Jews on a personal level, either. Our neighborhoods are



shockingly segregated. Whenever I enter a busy restaurant in San Francisco or Marin, I take note of how many black patrons are there, and I'm always amazed if I see more than two in a restaurant packed with white people.

And that is one reason why I'm so proud of the Emanu-El congregants who started the Black-Jewish Unity group nearly two years ago. Each month, this group of primarily Emanu-El members (some of whom are also people of color) gather along with local African American community leaders to engage on issues of racial justice. Over time, this Unity Group has given us—both black and white people—the opportunity to get to know one another on a more personal level. For example, I was surprised to learn that many African-American Christians wish to foster closer relationships with Jews!

With regard to justice issues, the Black-Jewish Unity group has decided to spend the next year advocating for bail reform in the State of California. Most of us have never had to post bail for a family member. And even if we did, we likely had the financial resources to ensure that the bail was paid fairly immediately. But too many poor people—often, even when they haven't even been convicted of a crime—are kept in prison for a long time because they are unable to post bail. The current bail system in our state consists of a network of private bail companies that charge large interest fees, and this serves to further impoverish already underprivileged families. Fortunately, there are some bills making their way through the California legislature to ameliorate such problems for low-income people accused of low-level offenses. Over the coming year, our Black-Jewish Unity group will study this legislation and advocate for bail reform.

David Brog is the author of Standing with Israel: Why Christians Support the Jewish State (2006), In Defense of Faith: the Judeo-Christian Idea and the Struggle for Humanity (2010), and Reclaiming Israel's History: Roots, Rights, and the Struggle for Peace (2017).

David Brog is executive director of the Maccabee Task Force, which combats anti-Semitism and the anti-Israel BDS movement on college campuses.

Previously he served as Executive Director of Christians United for Israel (CUFI), as chief of staff to Senator Arlen Specter, and as staff director of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The Forward newspaper listed Brog as one of the 50 most influential Jews in America. He is a graduate of Princeton University and Harvard Law School.



ECONOMIC JUSTICE

The Economic Justice Working Group established new partnerships this year with three organizations:

- The Meals on Wheels partnership delivered emergency preparedness kits to homebound seniors by our 3rd grade families and Young Adult Community.
- In partnership with Hamilton Families, we worked on three events
 this year. Our families sponsored 85 families who were moving
 into permanent housing, supplying each family with a customized
 collection of new household items. In honor of Tu B'shvat, Emanu-El
 members worked to beautify the garden at the Hamilton Families
 residential housing unit. And in connection with Purim, families were
 encouraged to donate diapers for Hamilton Families clients.
- Raphael House, an organization that helps at-risk families achieve stable housing and financial independence, we also partnered three times this year, each time preparing dinner for Raphael House residents.

This fall, the Economic Justice Working Group welcomed Jeff Kositsky, director of San Francisco's Homelessness Department, to speak to the congregation during Shabbat services. Greetings! In this section of the Temple *Chronicle*, you will see our Congregation's Tzedek Council showcased. The Tzedek Council seeks to respond to the indignities impacting our community by turning our Reform Jewish values into social justice action to transform our world into a more just society. From feeding the homeless to working with refugees, from conserving water to improving literacy, your fellow congregants engage in Tikkun Olam (healing the earth) in exciting, innovative, and meaningful ways.

I invite each of you to think about just one way you can implement social justice this season. Perhaps it could be volunteering to distribute food, partnering with Raphael House. HUMAN RIGHTS

This year, the Human Rights Group made great strides in working with refugees.

- Following the 2016 High Holy Days, a group of congregants gathered to assemble "welcome home" packages for refugees that were resettled through the help of Jewish Family and Community Services of the East Bay.
- The Human Rights group, along with a newly formed Interfaith Welcome: Bay Area Refugee Support Group,* launched a teddy bear campaign, which resulted in over 5,000 teddy bears being delivered to Syrian refugees currently residing in Jordan.
- In connection with Passover, we reached out to the Emanu-El community to collect items for refugee families resettled in the East Bay.
- The Human Rights Group also hosted the 30th Annual Martin Luther King Jr. weekend pulpit exchange with Third Baptist Church.
- This year, Emanu-El's Black-Jewish Unity Group has been meeting monthly to promote issues of racial justics and participated in the MLK march and continues to meet monthly to promote issues of racial justice. We also partnered with the Emanu-El Women's Group to view 50/50 Day, a film focused on creating more equality across the world.

ENVIRONMENT

The Environmental Working Group had a transformative second year sponsoring the following diverse events:

- Participated in a community garden-building event at Hamilton Families
- Sent a volunteer group to a San Francisco Botanical Garden event to weed an area along the perimeter path
- Co-hosted a lecture with Emanu-El's Israel Action Committee by an expert on Israel's innovative drip irrigation methods and water abundance;
- Led an Ocean Beach clean-up for the religious school's 7th grade mitzvah corps program; and
- Represented Emanu-El at the San Francisco Earth Day Celebration.

For the upcoming year, we're working on putting together a Shabbat service in an outdoor "green" venue to focus on the relationship between environmentalism and Judaism. We look forward to congregants joining our important agenda and adding their own ideas for Tzedek Council environmental/social justice activities.

ONE RABBI'S EXTRAORDINARY JOURNEY TO MEET REFUGEES STRANDED IN GREECE

In April of this year, Senior Rabbi Beth Singer was invited to take part in a special group trip that included local Bay Area rabbis and Muslim leaders to learn more about the challenges faced by Syrian, Iraqi, and Afghani refugees surviving in Thessaloniki, Greece. Rabbi Singer sat down with me to answer some questions and share her insight and appreciation for all the work being done for the refugees—in particular, by IsraAID, an organization founded in 2001.

Byron Gordon: What prompted you to take this trip?

Beth Singer: Rabbi Allen Bennett, formerly of Temple Israel of Alameda, who comes to Emanu-El regularly, reached out to me in January that there was an effort to organize a group of rabbis from the Bay Area, including several local Muslim leaders, to go together and meet with refugees under the auspices of IsraAid, a non-governmental organization driven by Israelis.

Byron Gordon: How familiar were you with IsraAID?

Beth Singer: I was not very familiar with the organization's work at the time. We had two congregants who previously made trips to Lesbos to volunteer their time and provide clothing and supplies to refugees. One of them, Denise Aptekar, told me about her journey and IsraAID's involvement.

Byron Gordon: Rabbi Ryan Bauer sounded the alarm about the Syrian refugee crisis to our congregation back in 2015.

Beth Singer: Yes, he did! I'd been following the events in Syria so closely since the civil war broke out. The New Yorker magazine published a series of in-depth stories about the lives of human beings during the gas attacks and the dehumanization of large swaths of innocent people who have been trapped, desperately trying to escape. When this opportunity opened up for me, the idea that I could go and meet these people in person was very important to me.

Byron Gordon: Can you share anything about the Muslim leaders who participated?

Beth Singer: There were three Muslim leaders—Abbas Moloo, founder and principal of the Jafria Islamic School in Pleasanton; Sohail Abdullah, of

the Florida-based nonprofit Comfort Aid International; and Faharnaz Kermalli, a Los Angeles-based senior policy analyst in international affairs. It completely changed the makeup of the experience to have them together with an Israeli organization like IsraAid. The first day of the trip happened to be Holocaust Remembrance Day, and the Muslim leaders not only participated in services, but went to the Jewish museum with us. It was very powerful for me.

Byron Gordon: Talk to me about the itinerary that IsraAID arranged for your group.

Beth Singer: It was a very well-organized schedule. Fascinating that the first thing they had us do was learn about the Jewish history of Thessaloniki, a beautiful town on the Aegean Sea. Prior to World War II, a huge Jewish population with a thriving community lived there. The Nazis invaded it and took 50,000 Jews and shipped them to Auschwitz. The community was decimated. That was the backdrop for my meeting with the refugees.

Byron Gordon: Did you have a translator with you?



Beth Singer: Yes, and that's what was so brilliant about working with IsraAID. The organization consists of Jews and Arab-Israelis who work together. And the Jews, a few of whom speak some Arabic, rely on Arab-Israelis to do the translation. While other organizations provide food and clothing, IsraAID brings psychologists and therapists to help refugees process what is happening to them. The Arab-Israelis that I met are doing this with IsraAID, and it enables them to help their Syrian brothers and sisters.

Byron Gordon: Talk to me about the state of mind of these refugees. Anything particular stand out for you?

Beth Singer: Yes. I got to speak to many of the refugees, one on one. And I never once heard a whiff of bitterness from any one of them. That amazed me. Their situation is terrible because, even though some of them are now in relative comfort and they did escape with their lives, they are real Syrians, Iraqis, and Afghanis who desperately want to be back home, but their countries aren't safe now so they are stuck



in Greece. Also, a European Union rule states that the first country you land on as a refugee is where you stay; you don't get to move to another country. This ruling came about as a result of Europe being overwhelmed with refugees.

Byron Gordon: How are refugees staying in contact with their families, relatives, and loved ones?

Beth Singer: If there's one thing that is not in short supply, it's smartphones. And many of these refugees do have smartphones. They are in contact with relatives who were able to escape to countries like Germany, Sweden, and Holland, and a lot of them want to be repatriated with their family to these other European countries. Their basic needs are being met while in Greece, but they are not free because they can't get jobs and are stuck in a sort of way station.

Byron Gordon: There seems to be no end in sight to the Syrian civil war.

Beth Singer: Yes. It seems as if there is nothing but carnage, war, and refugees. We did meet an interesting sect called the Yazidis. They're Kurdish, and their particular religion has elements of many different religions. They are being driven out and murdered by ISIS the way Jews were during the Holocaust. I remember when the newspapers reported back in 2014 about a stand-off in which ISIS went after the Yazidis. They killed 5,000 in a small location in Iraq. A large group of Yazidis were able to escape to the top of Mt. Sinjar in the mountains of Iraq. ISIS tried to starve them out. Somehow, they were able blow out a path through the mountain. The ones I met escaped through that mountain. It's an incredible story.

Byron Gordon: In one of your recent sermons, you talked about how we in America should consider ourselves as lottery winners. You used it as a metaphor meaning we've already won something greater than money by being able to live in

a place where we have freedoms now denied to refugees. But phenomena like xenophobia and racism still exist. Can this be overcome?

Beth Singer: Most Americans don't encounter refugees because the U.S. is geographically far removed from the current situation. I thought about the length of time it took for our group to get to Greece and to come back, and that's part of the reason we don't have as many refugees in this country. We don't encounter them and we don't know them as human beings. I'm convinced that if any of the xenophobic (or "that's not our problem") people were to meet these refugees, their perspective would change. Many have been raised to hate the Jewish people... and not just Israel, but Jews. Our group constantly reminded refugees that we're Jews and Muslims doing this work together. It's amazing when a person who has never met a Jew and has been told his whole life that Jews are evil, all of the preconceptions just fall away when he actually meets a Jewish person who wants to help him. Here in the U.S., the reason so many of us wish we could win the lottery is we think of millionaires and billionaires and dream of great wealth. We compare ourselves to these people because we don't have all that money and we're always working to pay our bills, etc. But if we could see our lives compared to these

refugees, we'd see that WE are the millionaires and billionaires.

Byron Gordon: About IsraAID – Do you want to see this organization put more on the radar within the Jewish community?

Beth Singer: Absolutely. This organization is so intrepid, and the people involved really take their own experiences of local catastrophe and then use everything they learn to help others. And the fact that their model includes Jews, Arabs, and Muslims working together is incredibly inspiring! Only good can come from it, for the Jewish people and the whole world. If people want to help refugees, the single most effective thing they can do is support IsraAID. The work being done goes to the heart of what refugees need and is making a difference in their lives.
