Time may change me But I can't trace time.

I've always loved that classic David Bowie song, Changes. Those opening chords, the beat, and that wistful opening, "Still don't know what I was waiting for, and my time was running wild." The song came out the year before my Bat Mitzvah. Talk about Changes. Oy. Puberty. Leaving home. Learning. Growing. Changing. Heraclitus said that the only constant in life is change.

More about change in a moment. But first, I'm excited for you to read all the pages of this month's Chronicle. One thing that hasn't changed is our commitment to providing the widest variety and depth of Jewish experience. As you thumb through the pages, take note of the different religious, educational, and cultural activities coming up in the next few months. From our Welcome Back Shabbat on Friday, August 25 to our upcoming High Holy Day services and events to the thrill of scholar Adam Kirsch in November (Google him! It's a big deal), there are as many opportunities for you to strengthen your connection to Judaism and to Emanu-El as fit in your schedule.

We recently opened the fifth book of Torah, the Book of Deuteronomy, or D'varim. D'varim literally means "stuff" or "words," or "words about stuff." Throughout D'varim, Moses looks back with the Israelites and reviews all the changes that have taken place and are yet to take place as the Israelite people stand at the threshold of the Promised Land after a long sojourn in the wilderness.

Like those Israelites, we, too, stand at the threshold of our Promised Land. Portions of our building are under renovation. We continue to gather in our Main Sanctuary and around the Bay. Sometimes, though, it feels like we are wandering in the wilderness —holding meetings in coffee shops, looking for other venues around the City for programs, preparing to gather in our Main Sanctuary for the upcoming High Holy Days.

Change is hard! Seeing evidence of the renovation in progress can feel unsettling. Uncertainties about what it is all going to look and feel like when the new building opens can make us feel anxious.

Right now, we are all together in the wilderness marching toward the promised land of a stunningly renovated building that is far more safe, secure, welcoming, and user-friendly than the one that served our people so well for these past 100 years.

This year, the changes you see happening as you arrive for High Holy Day services may feel off-putting at first. Try this. When you see the changes as the building is transformed, see those changes as an invitation to take stock of how you want to change in this coming year. Do you want to spend less time on your

device? Give more to the community? Focus on your friendships? Work on patience? Stand up for human rights? Show your love for San Francisco? Deepen one aspect of your Jewish practice? Strengthen your Jewish identity? The High Holy Days teach us that change is desirable and possible! If Congregation Emanu-El can change to meet the needs of the time, so can we.

Change is hard. But change is easier when we journey together. It might be tempting to check out for a couple years and come back when it is all done. But we need you now. Please be sure you have renewed your membership. That commitment means so much to us and enables us to serve the whole community. Have you encouraged friends to join us? Bring them to our beautiful services, educational and social justice events. Jewish or non-Jewish, every week new people walk through our doors, find meaning in our Jewish path, and choose to walk with us. Are your kids enrolled in YFE and in our Teen programs? They will experience so many more changes throughout their lives. The kids and teens who come to our youth programs attest to the sense of connection, love and meaning they get from peers and the loving, supportive adults who run our youth programs.

Learning leads to changing leads to growing. "Ch-ch-ch-ch-ch-changes. Turn and face the strange!" We don't have to do it alone. We can face the familiar and the strange together.

Preserving the Past While Building the Future

Emanu-El members - you are making history. In late June, the construction component of Emanu-El Next began in earnest. Just as impressive as the work being done to the physical building are the ways we're building new and innovative programming and services to engage and inspire our community.

Emanu-El Next is as much about preserving what's great about Emanu-El as creating new spaces and ways of being in community with one another. Whether as a backdrop for a special simcha or for grabbing apples on Rosh HaShanah to celebrate the sweetness of the new year, the courtyard fountain has been part of so many special moments. This month, our construction and preservation teams lovingly removed the fountain to keep it safe during construction. If you were in the area, you witnessed an enormous crane - our contractor's largest! - gently hoisting the fountain into the air for a safe landing on a flatbed truck that transported it for safekeeping. We plan to incorporate the fountain into the renovated courtyard to keep its traditional role as a central gathering place.

This month also saw us digging deep – into spaces under the courtyard that are currently unusable. These spaces will be reimagined as a new welcoming and community engagement area in the new facility.

Preservation and digging deep also describe our services, programming, and engagement efforts during construction. Emanu-El is not just open during construction, we're vibrant and thriving, with deep, meaningful activities for education, community-building, and prayer. We're preserving what you cherish most about Emanu-El, such as our Shabbat services and lifecycle events, which are continuing in our beautiful Main Sanctuary. And we're finding new ways for members to worship, study, and engage together:

For adult learners

We're bringing adult learning opportunities to you by holding speakers' programs at locations around the city, including members' homes and partner organizations like the Contemporary Jewish Museum.

For parents with young children

We're holding informal meetups at parks and educational locations like the California Academy of Sciences as well as Park Shabbats.

For numerous affinity groups

We're developing a variety of monthly Shabbat gatherings and dinners.

For the whole community

We're planning a joyous Simchat Torah procession and celebration from our temporary school site at Star of the Sea School to Emanu-El.

These programs, and many others, will deepen our connections and inspire us to repair the world together.

A Beautiful New Learning Space For Our Youngest Congregants

After many months of planning and much anticipation, Emanu-El's Preschool (CEEP) and the Youth and Family Education Program (YFE) have relocated to Star of the Sea on 9th Avenue. Beginning in late August, our beautiful, temporary space, previously home to the Laurel School and the San Francisco Girl's School will be teeming with Emanu-El students and families. For the next two years, Emanu-El will have full run of the building, dedicating the bottom two floors to the Early Education Center and the top two to YFE. Several staff and administrative offices, along with the main Temple office, have already begun operating from the space and soon, staff will resume meetings and many congregant-facing programs from the facility.

"This is an incredible milestone in our project," shares Nika Greenberg, Senior Director of Business Operations and Early Education, who spearheaded the relocation. The move took a full year of planning, the support of endless stakeholders, and the collaboration of the entire Emanu-El team. However, "we aren't done yet", she explains, "we are in the process of tenant improvements and our education teams are working around the clock to ensure the learning spaces are set up thoughtfully and intentionally, with our students' needs in mind."



Although this building was built and set up as a school, several changes need to be made to serve the wide range of students in our programs, comply with California Community Care Licensing requirements, and ensure that the building meets our safety and security standards. To this end, an incredible cross-functional team of Emanu-El staff and consultants is working tirelessly on this phase of the project, including Emanu-El's Director of Technology, Emilie Valentine, Director of Security, Lawrence Francis, and Building Superintendent, Fabian Vazquez.

The Preschool will open its doors to students on August 28th, and YFE will begin their school year with the High Holiday Fair on September 10th. As the teaching staff returns at the end of summer, they, too, will have an opportunity to put their stamp on the facility; each team will gather for professional development prior to the programs' respective starts and will work together to make the classrooms their own, reflecting their philosophies, values, and goals for the school year.

With construction and setup complete in mid- August, we will preview the facility to the incoming families to help students become familiar and comfortable with their new learning environments. "We can't wait to see students inhabit this incredible space. We are so fortunate to remain in our neighborhood, right across from the Public Library, steps from Mountain Lake Park, and walking distance to the Temple!" shares Greenberg. We are tremendously grateful for the partnership of the Star of the Sea Church and the congregant volunteers who have graciously offered their time and talents to help us prepare for the upcoming school year and are eager to welcome our community into our temporary home.



Get ready for a fun talk, demonstration, and small bites of some of Sussman's recipes.



I have visited San Francisco a whole bunch, we have family out here. I came here growing up to visit, I remember going to Noah's Bagels. I spent a lot of time in the Bay Area over the last ten years; coming to a program called "Queer Talmud Camp" which took place, before the pandemic, in Marin County. First I went as a participant, and then I was on the staff. It was there that I got to know Rabbi Jason Rodich and Cantor Marsha Attie.

What do you love most about San Francisco so far?

[I love] the beauty within the city. There is no city like it in my opinion. Whether it is the architecture, the sky, or the hills in the distance. Everything- the constant beauty [when] walking around. Something about being surprised by the beauty at every corner.

What was Judaism like for you growing up?

[Living] In Montclair, New Jersey, I grew up with Judaism at the center of my household. Our synagogue, friends, and community were the most important parts of our lives.

What is your favorite part about being a Rabbi?

I find people endlessly fascinating. There is a world in every person, and I enjoy the opportunity to travel from world to world with every person I meet.



We believe that Judaism guides us on our journey to be better people, create community, and repair the world. Our historic home has long been cherished as a magnificent building that symbolizes Jewish arrival and integration into our city. But the building no longer adequately serves the needs of the Emanu-El community and hinders our ability to effectively support and engage our congregation. The demands of the 21st century Jewish community—and Emanu-El's 1,800 congregant families—are quite different than those of the 300 families in the 1920s who created our current building. That's why we have embarked on an ambitious effort to revitalize and reimagine our home to meet

the expanding needs of our current members and those of generations to come.



DONOR SPOTLIGHT

Bob Tandler and Valli Benesch

Across four decades of marriage and working together, Bob Tandler and Valli Benesch remain in love and in business. Mutual respect, aligned priorities, and deep friendship have sustained their marriage and working relationship as co-CEOs and parents. "Before we were married," Bob says, "a dear friend gave me this one piece of advice... you go to the altar every day."

Valli, a first-generation American, is immensely grateful for the Jewish community that welcomed her family when they fled Europe in the 1940s. San Francisco was a safe haven for refugees who had experienced the horrors of war, and the Jewish community provided a strong sense of support and solidarity for her family, who joined Congregation Emanu-El soon after arriving.

Valli went to Lowell High School, graduated from Stanford with a BA in history, and studied law at the University of Chicago. She pursued a career in law before entering her family's apparel manufacturing and design business, Fritzi California. She worked beside her father, learned the business, and became CEO in 1983 at a time when women executives were few and far between. "I didn't know any other women in my position," Valli says. "It was very lonely, but an incredible opportunity."

"She broke a lot of glass ceilings"

Bob remarks with pride. His upbringing was drastically different than his wife's. Bob's father, having immigrated from Vienna to St. Louis, was devoted to assimilating into the local community. Although Bob attended Sunday school, he was more focused on working to put himself through school and financed his own education. Before starting law school at Washington University in St. Louis, he traveled to California, having never been west of Kansas. "Somewhere between Santa Cruz, San Francisco and Yosemite, I knew San Francisco was where I wanted to live." Bob says. The day after graduating, he moved here.

After moving to San Francisco and commencing his legal career, Bob got involved with the Jewish community through the Young Adults Division of the Jewish Community Federation (JCF), where he and Valli met. Forty-three years later, he recalls that first encounter with reverence. After they were married, Valli's family invited Bob to leave his law practice and join her family business in 1986. In the meantime, they were blessed with two wonderful daughters, Michelle and Jaclyn. In 1998, after the sale of their apparel manufacturing business, they wanted to give back to the community that had given them so much, so they visited Phyllis Cook who became an invaluable mentor, recommended Valli for the Wexner program, and guided them into early opportunities for leadership and philanthropy.

Valli and Bob remained co-CEOs of Fritzi Realty, their real estate investment, management and development firm, and continued to pursue their support for Jewish organizations like the JCF, Jewish Family & Children's Services, and JCCSF. Bob serves on the Board and is Development Chair at Congregation Emanu-El and Chairs the San Francisco-Haifa Sister City Committee which recently took Mayor London Breed to Israel. They also support and serve on the Boards of community hospitals like SF General Hospital Foundation and UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital. As avid fans of the arts they contribute to the opera, ballet, and symphony. "Our giving changed as our ability to give grew," Valli says. "We believe you give according to your means." They both agree that "the mantra in our house is not could or would or should. It's must. We believe if you can give and serve, you must, because it's part of your obligation to the community."

Valli and Bob have deepened their connection to Jewish life at Emanu-El and through their Wexner experience. Bob came to appreciate the beauty of Torah, but it was being embraced by the Jewish community that brought him into the fold. "It felt like: you're one of us, we want you to be with us, and we're here for you," he says. "You go to Emanu-El on a Friday night and you've got Rabbi Jonathan Singer out there standing in the rain without a top coat, welcoming everybody into the shul! The arms are wide open." Both reflect on how Emanu-El has touched them in life's most joyous and trying moments. "Few institutions can impact your life in so many ways – and not just your life, but generation after generation."

In a world of increasing complexity and social isolation, Valli and Bob want our congregation to continue to be an invaluable source of support and connection for the community. They dedicate the merit of their gift to Emanu-El Next for the benefit of their daughters and future generations. Valli marvels at how Emanu-El has evolved over her lifetime, while Bob reflects on the founding families who had the foresight to build a sanctuary that could support a congregation nearly ten times the size of their original community. Driven by the vision of expanding our synagogue into a hub of worship, community connection, education, and love, they sense the tremendous opportunity our congregation has to create a focal point for the future of Judaism and the local Jewish Community.
