
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Our Sacred Sanctuaries

There is that moment when we come up the steps of the bimah and approach the ark that is for many, breathtaking. The view from up high is pretty amazing, but seeing the ark up close, the intricate design and tremendous attention to detail, its beauty is astounding. The artists who created at the behest of the architect, tried to utilize materials that the Torah describes as



having been part of the design of the original ark lapis lazuli, rubies, gold, and there are even stave rings, to recall the ancients carrying the ark through the wildernessthough I can't imagine anyone being able to lift the one in our sanctuary. It must weigh a few tons.

As we find ourselves entering this new year in the midst of construction, I am grateful that our Main Sanctuary will be fully available for all of services. For many Jews, these words are an inseparable pairing. We dip a slice of apple in honey to express our hopes for a sweet and fruitful year.



Pomegranates

The seeds of the pomegranate symbolize the 613 *mitzvot* (sacred obligations) attributed to the Torah, which form the foundation of traditional Jewish practice. The abundance of seeds in the pomegranate also symbolizes fertility. Many Jewish families serve the fruit on Rosh HaShanah in the hope that the coming year will bring many blessings, much prosperity, and the opportunity to do good deeds.

Danny Grossman

Although born and raised in San Francisco, for Danny Grossman, immigration stories are a part of his family's history, woven with migration and survival. With family who settled in Israel and the US, Danny's perspective has been indelibly marked on the plight of those seeking refuge. Danny's father has roots in Kiev, and subsequently journeyed through Harbin, China. His wife, Linda Gerard has a similar story, with her own mother escaping from prewar Germany following the horrors of Kristallnacht.

At the core of Danny's involvement lies a resonance with the Jewish principle of welcoming the stranger, born from the awareness that we were all strangers once. This guiding principle echoes throughout his work, infusing each action with a sense of sacred purpose. To those considering supporting the Ukraine Resettlement Initiative, Danny offers a heartfelt message: "This is deeply meaningful, sacred work. We are all pointing the way toward a future of refugee resettlement in the US where private citizens will be called upon to bear more responsibility." Danny has taken on a vital role of Budget and Finance on the Welcome Circle. This position entails not only ensuring the initiative's financial stability but also



setting the Taranov/a family on a trajectory toward financial independence and security. His dedication to financial responsibility is rooted most in empowering the Taranov/a family to build a stable future for themselves and their loved ones.

Looking ahead, Danny hopes this program will be transformative for its families. Beyond the immediate impact on the Ukrainian refugees, he envisions a profound ripple effect on the larger community. The initiative's success, he believes, will help shape the next chapter of US refugee resettlement, fostering a future where compassion and communal support are the guiding lights.

Cindy Marks Shegalov

"The impact of collective goodwill cannot be underestimated."

Hailing from Maryland, just outside DC, Cindy Shegalov's upbringing in an interfaith family instilled in her a deep commitment to inclusion and to celebrating diverse backgrounds. Cindy's motivations to contribute to the Ukraine Resettlement Initiative are deeply intertwined with the immigration narrative of her own family and of those in her community. From tutoring immigrants in Boston's Chinatown during college to learning about her husband's journey from Russia to Germany to the United States, Cindy has experienced firsthand the aspirations, challenges, and the transformative power of embracing a new beginning. Currently at the helm of the Documentation & Legal aspect of the initiative, Cindy's experience navigating complex government and administrative processes is an integral part of the puzzle that will help the Taranov/a family overcome bureaucratic obstacles. Cindy will also collaborate with legal experts within the congregation, leveraging the collective support and strength of our community.

Guided by her Jewish values of tikkun olam and the imperative to welcome strangers, Cindy's message to others considering support for the initiative is clear: every individual has unique skills and resources to offer. She emphasizes that whether through time, financial support, personal expertise, or logistical assistance, the impact of collective goodwill cannot be underestimated.

For Cindy, the ultimate aspiration for the Ukraine Resettlement Initiative is to provide the families with a sense of safety, belonging, and opportunity, while fostering a connection to both their newfound home and the culture they carry with them.

Men's Group Is Back!


Join us for our first Men's group of the year, Sunday, September 10.







We believe that Judaism guides us on our journey to be better people, create community, and repair the world. Our historic home has long been cherished as a magnificent building that symbolizes Jewish arrival and integration into our city. But the building no longer adequately serves the needs of the Emanu-El community and hinders our ability to effectively support and engage our congregation. The demands of the 21st century Jewish community - and Emanu-El's 1,800 congregant families - are quite different than those of the 300 families in the 1920s who created our current building. That's why we have embarked on an ambitious effort to revitalize and reimagine our home to meet the expanding needs of our current members and those of generations to come.



Donor Spotlight Dale Boutiette and Alla Gershberg

Alla Gershberg and Dale Boutiette come from worlds apart. Born in Kiev and immigrating to Cleveland at 11, Alla's background as a Soviet Jew gave her a dualistic view of Jewish identity: you were either culturally Jewish, and held identity lightly – or Orthodox, kept kosher, wore the garb, and held ritual strongly. Like many émigrés, Alla felt strongly Jewish identified, but ambivalent and unknowing of religious ritual.

Born and raised in the Bay Area, Dale's parents were of different faiths – one Catholic, one Lutheran – but by the


time he was born they had long rejected organized religion. He was encouraged to find his own spiritual path, should the need arise.

They met through work in the 1990s. She had her MBA, he wanted to go to law school. When Dale passed the bar exam, he worked in litigation until deciding to pursue his own estate planning practice. "I thought of estate planning as a method to protect families – to allow them to do with their money as they wish." In the late 90s, while volunteering for the AIDS Legal Referral Panel (ALRP), Dale realized that LGBTQI+ families lacked basic protections under state law that he had taken for granted. "I wanted to help a group of people that really needed it." He practiced for almost a decade before joining Alla in real estate sales in

the early 2000s. As they considered life with children, Dale asked Alla: "Shouldn't we figure out what it means to raise a Jewish child?" He remembers it took her aback. "At first she thought: Oh gosh! He's going to want to change our lives considerably!" He laughs. "But, no, I just felt strongly that our children should understand what it means to say, 'I'm Jewish.'"

They found an Intro to Judaism class at Emanu-El together. It spoke to Dale right away. The core values of putting life in action and doing good in the community spoke to Dale. He converted, and

their whole world did change – but not in the way they expected. A nourishing community emerged from every facet of the Jewish world that touched their lives. Their two daughters, Isabel and Sabrina, were both became B'nai Mitzvah at Emanu-El and went to Jewish day school at Brandeis. Brandeis wasn't just a place to educate their kids, but a hub among families. Today, at High Holy Days, they sit side by side with the many fellow parents, families, and friends they've made there and at Emanu-El over the years.



At 38, Alla was diagnosed with colon cancer – the very cancer that took her mother's life only weeks after her diagnosis. The treatment became a fact of their lives, but they were determined to minimize the impact on their young daughters' daily lives. The Brandeis and Emanu-El community offered profoundly meaningful gestures of support. Parents organized meal trains, phone calls, regular visits, and helped their daughters get to afterschool activities. "The community propped us up and would not let us fall."

"What came out of it was the realization that life is better in community," Dale says. "Community works when you give yourself up to your community without seeking anything in return." He says it's been his and Alla's mantra since – the fueling source for both their involvement in every community they're a part of – just to be involved, for its own sake. "It matters. It's meaningful."

Over the years, Alla has been involved with JFCS, particularly on the committee for the Russian Emigre Community Gala. Dale currently serves on the board of Hamilton Families, and has been on the boards of JCRC, Camp Tawonga, Brandeis, and Emanu-El.

They see Emanu-El Next as a considerable step forward in making sure that, from a physical building standpoint, our congregation is ready to engage and serve the Jewish and the broader San Francisco community for the next hundred years. Their wish for Emanu-El is to see it become an even greater force for good through the Tzedek Council and many activities that benefit our City and beyond.

"Emanu-El is more than a place to go for Shabbat and High Holy Day services." Dale says. "And our congregation has spoken volumes about their love of Emanu-El through their generosity. But we believe generosity doesn't mean how many digits are in your gift, but how meaningful the gift is – so that's why we gave the most meaningful gift of our lives to pay it forward in honor of those who paid it forward for us a century ago."


